## Principal Report



It was with great pride that I was able to complete a whole year as Principal of Narrogin Primary School. It has continued to be a privilege to work with our staff, students and community on our school improvement journey, moving us from a good school to a great school where we are able to build upon the strong traditions and expertise that are already in our school.

Once again, I welcome this opportunity to share and celebrate with you all the success we experienced through 2024. We worked together as a strong team to achieve great outcomes for our school. I commend our staff for the extra efforts they put in each and every day to support our students to experience progress in their learning and achieve success.

We began our school improvement journey through the Fogarty EDvance program that offers us an integrated leadership, management and support program tailored to meet the needs of our school and to improve the educational outcomes of our students.

Our Aspiration: to move from performing inconsistently in NAPLAN to consistently performing above 'like schools' and closer to the state average in Reading and Student Engagement.

We are going to achieve this through:

- 1.Developing whole school low variance in teaching for high academic progress and achievement.
- 2.Building leader and staff capacity to improve teaching and learning.
- 3. Promoting student engagement and wellbeing within a safe, supportive learning environment.

We have begun by targeting professional learning in high impact instruction through participating in the Teach Well program. Two of our teachers have completed this program prior to 2024, with another three completing the program by the end of the year. We will endeavour to provide all of our teaching staff with the opportunity to participate in professional learning in high impact instruction by the end of 2025.

I would like to thank our School Board for their collaboration and input into our school as we worked together to understand school governance. Our School Board Chair, Mrs Carly Smith and I have worked to develop our new partnership to set the strategic direction of our school.

Our P&C has continued to excel with their fundraising efforts to provide additional resources to our school. Through the support of a FRRR grant, we were extremely fortunate to work in partnership with the P&C to install Funky Monkey bars to improve the playground space for our students.

As we look towards 2025, we want our strong reputation within our school community, to continue. We want our results to be consistently above like schools, we want every student and every educator in our school to experience success and make progress every day. We want to make a difference to the lives of every child in our school and for some, to change the trajectory of their lives, through building strong relationships with them, and adequately prepare them with transferable skills so they can thrive and flourish in a connected society.


Narrogin Primary School has a proud history of serving the Narrogin community for children from Kindergarten to Year 6.


Our school motto, 'In the Pursuit of Excellence', reflects the belief that every child can be successful. We take a personal approach to prepare children to be life-long learners and active citizens in the wider community. We are here to ensure your child is supported to achieve their full potential.

In 2024 we commenced the year with 301 students enrolled from Kindergarten to Year 6. We experienced a transiency rate of 22.3%, which is an increase from 2023 by over 7%.

Our Indicator of Socio-Economic Advantage (ICSEA) had for the period 2020 - 2023 maintained around 944. In 2024 our school experienced a decrease to 926 with a school ICSEA percentile of 16.

is planned for 2025.





**Tell Them From Me** captures student, parent, staff, and teacher voice to create a thriving school community.




